From our Pastor...

Anger is something that can be controlled. A preacher shared this example once. Even though people like to say they just get carried away, we know that anger is controllable. You know how when you're in the middle of a fight with your spouse, one of you is yelling, and the other is getting louder. Faces are red and tempers are high. Then the phone rings. One of you stomps over to the phone, picks it up, and starts [calmly] "Jones residence, how may I help you? Oh yes, little Timmy is doing well in school, and mother is recovering. Oh you don't say, Rose did what? Oh bless her heart. Well thank you for calling me dear, I'll talk to you later. Bye!" Just like that, in the middle of an angry temper, we switch to a calm voice when someone calls. We do it to save ourselves from embarrassment or guilt or whatever, but we can turn off the anger in a flash. So it's not uncontrollable. Controlling our reaction to anger is the first step to expressing anger in a non-sinful way. Managing anger starts in

This month's fifth Wednesday Prayer Fellowship is canceled due to the upcoming arrival of Pastor Ed's first child.

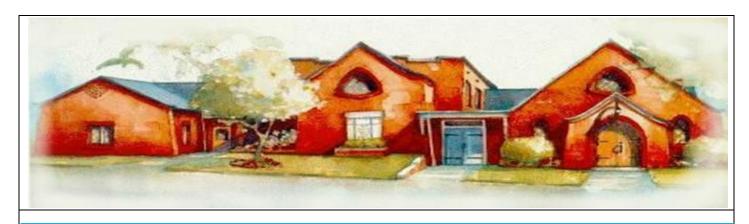
YOUTH GROUP — MAY 12TH AND 26TH

Kairos Prison Ministry "I was in prison and you visited me." Matthew 25:36

On April 9 2019, at 5:00 am I am up doing my morning devotions and in prayer for my next four days with my Kairos team. Going over last minute preparations and praying that the two men that I will be hosting later that evening will show up. I had sent each of them a letter two weeks earlier letting them know I will be their host and was looking forward to meeting them. Team members are assigned two residents the first two days to get to know them and to help make them feel at ease. I reflect back over the past Sunday and Monday when my church family provided me with the largest number of cookies that I have ever received from my church, I am so grateful for your response. The team is meeting at 9am at a church just down the road from the prison to sort all the cookies we bring in. We sort a dozen of different types into a small bag to be given to the 1200 residents at GreenRock along with a dozen greeting cards that we buy in bulk from a card company in Roanoke Va. Some of the team members will distribute the cookies and cards on wed night after lock down.

We head to the prison around 1:00pm after a group picture and lunch. We all have to go through check in , we have to sign in on two different books , no watches , keys , coins, etc, go through a metal detector and then padded down, we have a lot of team members with hip replacements and knee replacements, they must show documentation to get through the metal detector. Once cleared we are sent to the gym where we will be meeting. Only five of us at a time are allowed through three sets of gates that close behind you to get to the gym. All our supplies that we take in have to go through an xray machine before it can be taken in.

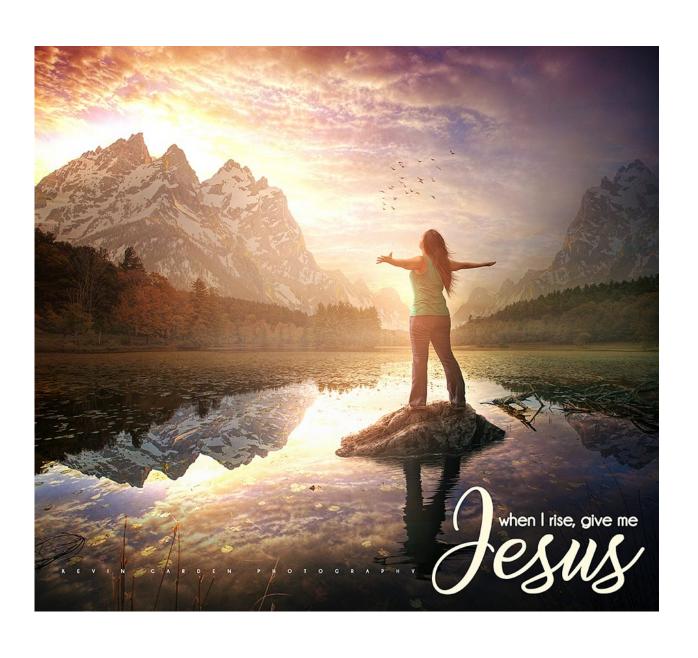
At 2:00 pm all the residents selected arrive, all forty-two come the first day. We greet them by calling out their name and who their host is and we give applause to each resident as they come through the door. We do this every morning as they come in. The two that I am to host show up and stand by me as we go through the rest of the residents. Once everyone is accounted for we sit down at tables to get to know each other and we eat cookies and drank coffee about 30 minutes before the program starts. The Team leader starts with the welcome and instructions that will have to be followed the next three days and then we all stand and introduce ourselves, , church, family, work for the team members. Name, where they are from, family, type of job they have in prison, and why they came to Kairos, for the residents. This takes about two hours with 42 of them and 33 of us. After this is completed dinner has arrived. There are three types of trays, regular, the commissary tray which is Kosher and a veggie tray, kosher and veggie has to have approval. Majority of us team members only eat one or two items off the tray, tonight's main menu was chicken and rice the other items I couldn't tell you what they were. After dinner we head to the Chapel, which is inside the gym also, there are Clergy meditations on: "Know yourself", "I chose you", "Prodigal Son" each last about 15 minutes After chapel we dismiss around 7:30 pm and they are sent back to their building. We tell each one that we are hosting that we are praying for them to come back the next morning and say good night.

Day 2: We arrive at the church at 6;45am to pray over all the speakers for the day, there will be five talks given by team members along with several meditations given in the chapel. We arrive at the prison at 7 am and go through the same thing we went through the first day to get cleared. The Residents start arriving at 8am only 41 come back the second day but we have 10 alternatives and we pick one, the others are returned and will be the first on the list next time. The residents are assigned to their family table, we have 7 tables all named after an apostle: John, Paul, Mark, etc. each table has 6 residents and 3 team members, a table leader, asst table leader and a clergy. This will be their family for the next three days, they will eat together, go to the chapel together and do everything together as a family. There will be talks given by team members each talk is 20 minutes, residents are to take notes doing the talks and after the talk there is a table discussion of the talks for about 15 mins and then the table has to work together to make a poster to represent what the talk represented to the table The five talks are, Choices, you are not alone, Friendship with God, The Church and Opening the Door. All the talks and meditations encourage positive self-examinations and is a day for the team to use our 4L's Listen, listen and Love, Love. We are in the chapel three times doing the day. This is the day that they are a little curious as to why we would come and spend time with them and treat them like they are somebody, not an inmate. Remember in prison you learn not to trust anybody. Next month I will closeout day 3 and 4 with a little more detail on our interaction with the guys. Ron
